



Campaign and Political Finance Penalty Summary

This summary represents an analysis of data pulled from the online campaign finance reporting system TRACER. The data covers the period from January 4, 2010 (when TRACER went live) through January 22, 2011. Contribution and Expenditure data contained in the TRACER system is self reported and is not independently verified by the Secretary of State's Office.




Contributions are reported on regularly scheduled disclosure reports. Analysis does not include pending or unreported contributions.




Penalties are imposed for late filings. This analysis does not include penalties imposed by an Administrative Law Judge through the Office of Administrative Courts.

Dollar Amount of Penalties Imposed By Committee Type (Total \$1.7m)




Section 10(2)(a) or Article XXVII of the Colorado Constitution requires the imposition of a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each day a required filing is delinquent.

Number of Penalties Imposed by Penalty Range (Total 1,305)



A penalty in the \$0-\$100 range represents a report that was filed up to two days late. Penalties greater than \$5,000 represent filings that were more than 100 days late.



Open penalties represent penalties that were unpaid at the time of analysis and were still accruing \$50 per day penalties. Waived penalties are those where the delinquent filer, pursuant to Section 10(2)(b) of Article XXVII of the Colorado Constitution filed a waiver request with the Secretary of States office within 30 days of the imposition of the penalty. Waivers may include penalties that were waived in full or in part.

Breakdown of Fines by Jurisdiction

Statewide filers include all executive offices (Governor, Attorney General) and all State Senate and House districts. County level filers include individuals seeking county offices such as Commissioner, Clerk and Recorder, and Sheriff.
